Zambia Orphans Aid supporter newsletter



We welcome ZOA's newest grassroots partner, **Twatasha Community School**. The centre was set up because there were insufficient state school places in the peri-urban district of Kafue which were accessible to children with disabilities. Twatasha is an inclusive school which provides an opportunity for disabled pupils to learn alongside their non-disabled peers. This breaks down the shame and stigma around disability whilst ensuring all children can access an education that will provide them with the skills they need to thrive.

Twatasha has about 750 students enrolled, and encourages children with disabilities to attend alongside orphans and children of parents with disabilities, as well as those from single parent homes, child-headed households and other highly vulnerable young people. A high proportion of malnourished and HIV+ children are referred to Twatasha. At present, ZOA is supporting Twatasha with an appeal for 200 new desks and chairs to help improve the quality of the learning experience.

It has been a busy start to 2022, with a new partner joining the ZOA family and two new British Zambian trustees being appointed to the ZOA-UK board.

We warmly welcome Mwelwa (Rumbi) Mukwashi and Florence Bili, who both bring considerable experience and enthusiasm to the board.

Rumbi is a British policy professional with Zambian heritage, working in the UK civil service. She



hopes to contribute to supporting the increase of opportunities open to youth in Zambia, while encouraging young people in the diaspora to get involved in giving, governance and nation building. Meanwhile,

Florence is a British Zambian lawyer and leads on children's safeguarding for a local authority.



*And there **WAS** light...*

We shone a spotlight on the need. You generously responded. And now hundreds of orphaned and vulnerable children across Zambia have received solar lamps from ZOA, throughout our network of grassroots partners. Thank you for your support.

It's all part of ZOA's goal to remove barriers to education. Because of unreliable (or non-existent) electricity supplies, our students told us that they were struggling to complete their homework at night. The unpredictable power situation was exacerbated by the chores that many young people are expected to do after school and by Zambia's proximity to the equator, meaning it is usually dark shortly after 6pm, regardless of the time of year.

We can't move Zambia (!) but the lamps – simple and effective – are now making a real difference to young people like Janet from **Hope & Faith School**, pictured above, who is studying to become a nurse.

So far, soap good...

The water supply to **Lubushi School**, Northern Province, has been improved, thanks to the installation of a new borehole, solar pump and 10,000-litre storage tank. The more reliable water supply is also helping the school to ensure their 1,200 students are regularly washing their hands. We are providing soap to every school child to help reduce the spread of infections such as COVID-19.




Thank you
